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




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Agriculture's share of U.S. GDP has fallen to less than one percent









Farm Earnings Less Important in Local Economies Now Than 30 Years Ago


Farming accounted for 20 percent or more of earnings in 877 nonmetro counties in 1969.

By 1999, farming accounted for 20 percent or more of earnings in only 258 nonmetro counties.









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

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
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Factors shaping farm policy debate

- Social and political landscape
 - equity issues
 - competing, non-commodity interests
- Market issues
 - high/volatile commodity prices
- International trade commitments/trade disputes



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Not all authorized funding is guaranteed...

- Mandatory ("entitlement") programs
 - Agriculture Committee jurisdiction; multi-year
 - Govt. costs vary depending on participation levels, market conditions, etc.
 - For example: commodity programs, SNAP
- Discretionary programs
 - Appropriations Committee jurisdiction; annual
 - When spending reaches the designated level, no more can be spent (unless more appropriated)
 - For example: research programs, some conservation programs



...and farm programs can change between Farm Acts

- To meet needs not covered by existing program
 - For example: disaster assistance; Recovery Act
- To cut spending
 - For example: budget reconciliation to reduce deficit
- When policy opportunities arise
 - For example: tobacco buyout gained votes for overall tax bill






Commodity programs/crop insurance just over 20 percent of projected 2008 Farm Act budget








Farm and commodity programs are expected to account for 13% of USDA's FY 2012 Outlays









Farm and Commodity Programs include direct payments, counter-cyclical payments, marketing loan benefits, ACRE payments, disaster payments, and crop insurance. All Other includes rural development, research, food safety, and marketing and regulatory function.



 - Sugar

 - Average Crop Revenue Election (ACRE)
 - Milk Income LossContracts (MILC)



Average income support program payments, 2007-2010









- Reduction in traditional program benefits
- Payments based on rolling national average prices and state & farm yields



Supplemental Agricultural Disaster Assistance



- Standing disaster program to assist farmers and ranchers who lose crops, livestock or trees due to disasters such as floods or drought
- Requires declaration of disaster and evidence of losses




Crop Insurance program

- Provides protection for revenue and yield risk
- USDA's Risk
 Management Agency subsidizes
 - Premiums for producers
 - Administrative costs and policy risk for companies






Working lands programs gaining as share of USDA conservation outlays



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
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Government payments are only a small share of farm cash receipts






Direct government payments vary over time


U.S. domestic support remains below WTO commitments



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
U.S. AMS: 1995 - 2009







Where do U.S. farm programs fit?

Amber (AMS)

- Product-specific: dairy and sugar price support programs, marketing loan program benefits, MILC (dairy) payments, ACRE payments, livestock disaster programs
- Non-product specific SURE, crop insurance, Countercyclical Payments, grazing and irrigation subsidies

Green:

 food and nutrition assistance, Direct Payments, conservation, other decoupled payments (peanut and tobacco quota buyouts)



Highlights of 2012 Farm Bill: Senate-passed bill

- Commodity programs
 - Marketing loans and crop insurance remain
 - New Agriculture Risk Coverage (ARC) replaces Direct
 Payments, Counter-cyclical Payments, and ACRE
 - Supplemental Coverage Option (SCO) and Stacked Income Protection Plan (STAX) offer additional insurance-type coverage
 - Dairy margin insurance replaces dairy product price support and MILC
 - Sugar program remains the same



Highlights of 2012 Farm Bill: Senate-passed bill

- Conservation programs
 - Continues CRP, EQIP, CSP
 - Consolidates smaller current programs into
 - Agricultural Conservation Easement Program (ACEP)
 - Regional Conservation Partnership Program (RCPP)
 - Conservation compliance for crop insurance
- Disaster programs renewed for livestock
- Nutrition programs
 - Reduces SNAP expenditures by \$4 billion



Highlights of 2012 Farm Bill: House Agriculture Committee bill

- Commodity programs
 - Revenue Loss Coverage (RLC) or Price Loss Coverage (RLC) replace DP, CCP, and ACRE
 - Crop insurance, marketing loans, disaster, dairy, sugar similar to Senate
- Conservation programs
 - Similar to Senate
- Nutrition programs
 - Reduces SNAP expenditures by \$16 billion
